# **2** Requests

- 1. As part of the HNO process merge the definitions of Community Garden and Farm, Market or Community-Supported 35.090-B and 35.090-C as drafted they are unnecessarily restrictive
- 2. Allow urban gardens as a use by right in all zoning districts

#### 35.090-B Community Urban Garden

An area less than one acre in area that is managed and maintained by an individual, group or business entity a group of individuals to grow and harvest food crops or non-food crops (e.g., flowers) for sale or distribution. An community urban garden area may be divided into separate garden plots or orchard areas for cultivation by one or more individuals or may be farmed collectively by members of the a group. Community Urban gardens may be principal or accessory uses and may be located on a roof or within a building.

- We can establish Tulsa as a nationally recognized food system innovation district

# Justification

- A 3-acre farm located at a church or school in any zoning district could feed 10,000 people, become an economic stimulus to rebuild community, create entrepreneurial opportunities, facilitate teaching through STEM while providing access to fresh, local high quality food
- Just as the proposed HNO, there are areas to the West, East, North, and South that have shared needs around food security



# Objectives

- Establish the HNO and Tulsa as a nationally recognized food system innovation district combining the existing initiatives of farm to table, buy fresh, buy local, urban farming, new urbanism, intentional communities, and STEM
- Creating entrepreneurial opportunities while providing education equivalent programs (analogy: apprenticeships)
- Utilize urban farming as a gateway to teaching STEM and transform under employed individuals into skilled labor

# The Challenge

- In business, as in a household, there are two ways to increase income:
  - Lower overhead and
  - Increase revenue
- Our target communities need both to avoid trading food dollars for transportation, housing, and child care.

# The Opportunity

- Growing one's own food
  - lowers one's cost of living
  - enhances family stability by providing food security
  - creates a potential for additional income
- Farming provides a gateway to Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math
- Equipment and transportation costs can be a barrier to entering the farming industry and urban farming can solve through:
  - Equipment: Micro farms using human labor instead of heavy equipment reduces equipment capital and operating expense barriers
  - Transportation: Urban undeveloped land, underutilized warehousing and facilities with convenient access to transportation corridors
- Local community members selling to the larger community allows those needing to be served to serve the community

- Food Assist in planting home gardens in the community
- Education Apprenticeship programs providing access of up to a 4 year certification using STEM through organic farming
